B.C. Liberals facing uphill battle to re-gain support

New British Columbia-wide poll finds New Democrats well ahead of Liberals and Conservatives; Premier Clark's approval rating low at 29%

Toronto, December 16th, 2011 – In a recent survey conducted by Forum Research among residents of British Columbia aged 18 years or older, it was found that if a provincial election were held today, most decided or leaning voters would back the New Democratic Party (34%), followed in a dead heat by the Liberal and Conservative parties (23% each), and the Green Party (15%). Five per cent of those polled indicated they would back another party. Support for the New Democratic party was significantly higher among voters aged 35-64 (23% 18-34, 42% 35-44, 37% 45-54, 43% 55-64, and 33% 65+), while support for the Liberal party was significantly higher among those aged 65 or older when compared to younger British Columbians (20% 18-34, 17% 35-44, 25% 45-54, 25% 55-64, and 28% 65+). It was also found that support for the Green Party was substantially higher among younger voters (30% 18-34, 13% 35-44, 8% 45-54, 7% 55-64, and 7% 65+).

Most British Columbians favour negotiating national deal when Health Accord is renewed in 2014

When it comes to the renewal of the national Health Accord in 2014, it was found that most British Columbians favour the provincial government negotiating a deal with the federal government along with other provinces to ensure a national deal is struck, as opposed to negotiating a deal alone that is best for the province (51% want the province to negotiate a national deal; 38% want a deal that is best for the province; 12% have yet to make up their mind). It was found that older British Columbians were significantly more likely to support the idea of negotiating a national deal (52% 18-34, 49% 35-44, 41% 45-54, 53% 55-64, and 57% 65+).

British Columbians split on support of Northern Gateway pipeline

The recent poll found that British Columbians were divided when it comes to supporting a Northern Gateway pipeline to carry Alberta crude oil to Kitimat, B.C., for shipment to Asia for refinement (41% support the pipeline; 46% do not; 13% of those polled did not have an opinion on the matter). Support for the pipeline was significantly higher among older British Columbians (34% 18-34, 36% 35-44, 42% 45-54, 48% 55-64, and 53% 65+), and males (54%; compared to 29% of females).

British Columbians divided on approval of a law prohibiting tanker traffic along the BC coast

When asked if British Columbians would approve of a law that would prohibit oil tanker traffic along coastal waters, it was found that four of 10 would support such a measure (40% approve, 44% disapprove, 16% did not have an opinion). It was found that older British Columbians were significantly more likely to disapprove (44% 18-34, 41% 35-44, 40% 45-54, 53% 55-64, and 45% 65+), along with those living on Vancouver Island or the Lower Mainland when compared to those living in the Interior North (49%, 45%, compared to 34%).

1 of 3 British Columbians say the province should keep the \$1.6 billion HST debt owed to Ottawa and proceed with cancelling the tax

The recent poll also found that more than one in three British Columbians (35%) think the province should keep its HST debt owed to Ottawa and proceed with cancelling the tax. Fewer than one in three think the province should keep the money and reinstate the HST (29%), fewer than one in four think the province should repay the debt and proceed with cancelling the HST (23%) and just over one in 10 have yet to form an opinion on the matter (13%). British Columbians residing in the Vancouver Lower Mainland, or Vancouver Island, were significantly more likely than those living in the Interior North to think the province should repay the debt and continue with cancelling the HST (25%, 25%, compared to 11%).

Fewer than 1 in 3 approve of the job Christy Clark is doing as premier

Christy Clark is facing strong public discontent with fewer than one in three approving of her job performance as premier (29%; 45% disapprove, 27% do not have an opinion). It was found that males were significantly more likely to disapprove of the job being done by Clark (51%; compared to 38% of females).

Just less than 4 of 10 polled approve of the job Adrian Dix is doing as Leader of the Opposition

Adrian Dix is faring better than the Premier when it comes to public approval ratings, with just fewer than four of 10 approving of the job he is doing as Leader of the Opposition (37%; 28% disapprove, 35% do not have an opinion). It was found that males were significantly more likely to disapprove of the job being done by Dix (37%; compared to 20% of females).

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Less than 1 of 4 polled approve of the job John Cummins is doing as leader of the Conservative Party

Fewer than 1 of 4 British Columbians approve of the job John Cummins is doing as leader of the British Columbia Conservative Party (23%; 32% disapprove, 45% do not have an opinion). It was found that older British Columbians were significantly more likely to approve of Cummins (21% 18-34, 17% 35-44, 22% 45-54, 27% 55-64, and 30% 65+).

“Christy Clark’s B.C. Methodology

The poll was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 1,045 randomly selected residents of British Columbia aged 18 or older. The poll was conducted on December 15th, 2011. Questions were asked of voters in the order reported as a standalone survey, not part of an omnibus.

Results based on the total sample are considered accurate +/- 3.0%, 19 times out of 20. Subsample results will be less accurate. Margins of error for subsample (such as age, gender) results are available at www.forumresearch.com/samplestim.asp.

Where appropriate, the data has been statistically weighted to ensure that the sample reflects the actual population according to the latest Census data.
